
- State legislative districts, school districts, voting precincts

- Population benchmarks






What's New for 2020

- 1. Optimizing Self-Response
 - Internet (45%)
 - Toll-free Number
 - Paper
- Re-engineering Address
 Canvassing (only about 30% done in the field)




What's New for 2020

- 3. Using high-quality data from trusted sources to reduce inperson follow up
- More automation (field workers to use mobile devices)



What Do We Ask?

- 1. Address
- 2. Phone Number
- 3. Count of Each Person At That Address
- 4. Name
- 5. Gender
- 6. Age and Date of Birth
- 7. Race
- 8. Hispanic, Latino or Spanish Origin
- 9. Whether Someone Lives Somewhere Else
- 10. Relationship
- 11. Citizenship *



How It Will Work

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate from a postal worker or a census worker





How It Will Work

WHAT WE WILL SEND IN THE MAIL		
On or between	You'll receive:	
March 12-20	An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)	
March 16-24	A reminder letter.	
	If you haven't responded yet:	
March 26-April 3	A reminder postcard.	
April 8-16	A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.	
April 20-27	A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.	

Private and Confidential

- Only aggregate data reported
- Prohibited by law from releasing personal information to any person or organization (USC, Title 13) *



- Life-time oath by all Census Bureau employees
- Penalties for wrongful disclosure: up to 5 years imprisonment and/or a fine of \$250,000

Working Together

Educate people about the 2020 Census and foster cooperation with enumerators

Encourage people to self-respond

Engage organizations to reach out to hard-to-count groups and those who aren't motivated to respond to the national campaign




Hard-to-Count Populations

- Foreign-born/Immigrants
- Children younger than 5
- Seniors
- Homeless
- Migrant workers
- Renters
- Low internet access



Complete Count Committees

- Volunteer committees established by state, local or tribal governments
- Include community leaders and organizations
- Increase awareness and motivate residents to respond to the census

What You Can Do

- Establish a Complete Count Committee
- Work to mobilize your community

- Recruit trusted voices in the community
